

**MINUTES OF MEETING OF  
WASHINGTON COUNTY PLAN COMMISSION  
Held August 5, 2013 at 7:00 p.m.  
Council Chambers—City Hall Building**

This public meeting was called to order by President, David Hoar, at 7:00 p.m. Member Jeff Souder led the members and audience present in the Pledge of Allegiance. Phil Marshall led the group in prayer. Attorney Thomas E. Scifres took roll and reported that all eight members were present, noting that Lane Freiberger's seat was still vacant. Phil Marshall made a motion to approve the minutes, seconded by Scott Maudlin. The minutes were approved by unanimous vote.

David Hoar addressed those present with opening remarks. The first new item of business was Richard Becht of Earth Savers Development LLC. Mr. Becht presented two (2) documents; the first was a Verified Petition to Vacate Subdivision Plan Plat and Covenants. The second was a Vacation of Dutch Park's Subdivision. Mr. Becht discussed plans to have seventeen (17) lots in this original plat. However, only two houses had been constructed and he planned to reduce the subdivision to four (4) lots. He reported that there was not a road developed that required vacating by the county. After discussion and a presentation of the law on the issue, Phil Marshall made a motion, seconded by Adam DuFour, to approve the vacation of the plat of Earth Savers Development, LLC presented by Mr. Becht, which was approved 8-0.

The second item of business as a presentation by John Mead, legal counsel for the Twin Rush and Elk Creek Conservancy Districts. He was present to request that the Plan Commission develop an ordinance relating to those districts and noted that attorney Andrew Wright, legal counsel for Delaney Creek Conservancy District, was also in attendance. Attorney John Mead stated that the purpose of his visit was to request that the Washington County Plan Commission include in its zoning ordinance restrictions on the construction of private residences on the breach side of dams in these conservancy districts. He noted that Twin Rush has two (2) dams at Lee Lake and Winslow Lake, classified as "high hazard" structures because of houses that had been constructed down stream. Delaney has seven (7) such "high hazard" dams. When these dams were originally constructed, they were not classified as "high hazard" dams. However, the state has since established new guidelines, whereby the definition of a "high hazard" dam has been modified, now rendering them in the higher risk category. Now classified as high hazard dams the state has asked the conservancy districts to hire engineers to re-design the spillways to protect these houses. The cost for such re-design and re-construction will be extraordinary.

Attorney Mead reported that the basis for the change in classification was the direct result of the existence of residences existing on the breach side of the dams and asked that the Plan Commission pass an ordinance preventing the construction of any new structures in the breach inundation area of any conservancy district dam. As high-hazard dams, these now must be inspected every two (2) years by a registered engineer. Mr. Mead noted that the tax base simply will not support the cost to upgrade dams. Attorney Andrew Wright noted that only one (1) dam has the spillway mapped out and a hydrological study will have to be completed. The Plan Commission expressed general agreement with the adoption of such an ordinance. President David Hoar asked whether NRCS could provide maps for the plan commission to work with, and whether every dam should be considered. The general consensus from both attorneys was in the affirmative as to both issues. Attorney Wright suggested that in the county's zoning ordinance, these areas should be treated as an "overlay district" and referred to as a "flood breach overlay district." Attorney Mead agreed that if the Plan Commission would favorably consider the proposal, he would contact NRCS to get technical data to assist in the mapping of these areas for drafting purposes. Jeff Souder made the motion, seconded by Adam Dufour to incorporate such language in the zoning ordinance, subject to receipt of further information from attorney Mead.

For the next order of new business, attorney Andrew Wright next appeared as a representative of the Salem Plan Commission. He requested an amendment to the subdivision control ordinance to recognize the territory outside the Salem City limits over which the Salem Plan Commission has zoning authority and further asked that such an ordinance provide that if someone lives within this jurisdiction, and wants to partition such real estate, the proposed subdivision of land must first be submitted for approval by the Salem Plan Commission prior to the County Auditor accepting the subdivision in the transfer books. Phil Marshall made the motion to allow attorney Wright to undertake the procedure to adopt such an amendment and to schedule the same for public hearing at the next meeting on September 10, 2013. Jim Day seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

Under old business, President David Hoar brought to the floor the subject of the pending draft of the Washington County Zoning Ordinance and the topic of set-backs for animal feeding operations. He reported that he had spoken with the state pork producers at Farm Bureau regarding the possibility of varied setbacks for animal feeding operations. Danielle Walker noted that Randolph County has a tiered system of setbacks based on animal units, which she had reviewed. President Hoar suggested that our ordinance needed to define the difference between a CAFO, a

CFO and an AFO. Because CFO referred to certain minimum animal units above those regulated by the state, he felt we needed to refer to "Animal Feeding Operations" (AFO) rather than "CFO."

President Hoar also reported that he had made contact with Danielle Walker and discussed innovative ideas regarding a point system and "odor abatement practices objectives." Under this system, a producer could achieve up to forty (40) points under each tier for odor abatement practices. Twenty (20) points would be awarded for the first method implemented in that tier for odor abatement and five (5) additional points would be awarded for each additional practice in each tier.

Danielle Walker also advised that she had spent time reviewing regulations on setbacks for animal feeding operations implemented in the state of Louisiana and the state of Illinois. Those, she reported, considered the difference between dry vs. liquid manure.

Phil Marshall advised that he had talked to East Washington Rural Water Corporation and the Town of Pekin regarding water usage. However, he had not spoken with Posey or Campbellsburg. East Washington Rural Water Corporation says that it is getting close to cutting the supply of water for any further confined feeding operations. A discussion ensued about water supply and whether it should be included as part of a point system or making water company approval and the availability of a second water source as mandatory in lieu of an optional point value.

The Commission then took up various individual categories for the award of potential "points" under the ordinance for discussion as follows:

a) The first discussion was the topic of section density. It was discussed that the evaluation of the population density in a "Section" in a township should be changed so as to encompass a one-half mile radius instead. The idea behind such a change would more directly account for the goal of addressing the impact on the population closest to the proposed operation. For instance, if an individual lived right at a section line, evaluating the density in that section would not account for the density population of neighbors just over the boundary line in the next section who were closest to a proposed operation.

b) Next was a discussion and general agreement that a farmer living on the property should be given points in the form of a "homestead credit." The rationale behind such an award is that those who actually live closed to an operation are more likely to take measures to abate odors and other nuisances from the operations.

c) Third was whether points should be awarded for existing land uses. Specifically, there was general discussion about the goals of the comprehensive plan and what points should be awarded in varying amounts based on whether the existing use of the property was tillable crop land, pasture land or wooded land. Member Adam Dufour pointed out that most good timber land does not lend well to animal feeding operations.

d) The next item of discussion was whether points should be awarded for any IDEM or EPA violations in the past by existing operators. Danielle Walker reported that she contacted IDEM and learned that most violations were in the nature of a paperwork violation. IDEM suggested that we limit any such point deduction to actual environmental spills or contaminations as opposed to technical paperwork violations.


e) The next topic of discussion was the award of points for an emergency management plan. President Hoar advised that this topic deals with environmental spills and has nothing to do with site location. Accordingly, there was a general consensus that an award of points to determine setback distances would not be appropriate on this topic.

f) The final category of discussion was the notification of neighbors. Attorney Scifres suggested that the notification of neighbors was a "best practices" issue that everyone seemed to agree should be a mandatory step rather than something for which farmers could be given favorable treatment and lower setbacks. He pointed out that awarding points to a proposed operation for simply sending a letter with no control over the content did not operate to help achieve the goal of determining appropriate setbacks. He suggested a form letter that would be required to be sent to all residences within a one-half mile radius. There was general consensus that this should be removed from the point system and established as a mandatory practice for the installation of a new operation.

President Hoar advised that he would try to make contact with consultant Kari Keller-Steele regarding the proposed point system ordinance for the next meeting. He concluded by reading a resignation letter he had received from Lane Freiberger. The commission discussed that Mr. Freiberger was an appointment to the Plan Commission by the Washington County Council. Mr. Hoar agreed to request that the council fill this vacant seat with a new appointment.

Phil Marshall made the motion to adjourn the meeting, seconded by Jeff Souder. The meeting adjourned by a vote of 8-0.




